which will expand a successful pilot program, increasing access to CTE dual credit courses and aligning those courses with our state's high-demand, high-wage jobs.


HB 1273 highlights:

- Extends the NW regional pilot led by the Washington State Board for Community and Technical Colleges for 2 more years
- Focuses on increasing CTE dual credit participation and credential attainment
- Aims to recommend future improvements to statewide dual credit policy

Key actions include:

- Cataloging available CTE dual credit courses
- Aligning courses with career pathways and apprenticeships
- Improving how credit is awarded and transcribed
- Supporting educators with professional development
- Helping schools with course alignment and outreach

ECHO TourSM events allow students to get close-up look at healthcare career options

While students in one room practiced CPR and other life-saving techniques, others figured out how to use a wheelchair and saw what exercises they could do to help increase someone's mobility. Others considered court cases involving people experiencing mental health challenges and others took a look at what art therapy can tell about the minds of children.

Across three days, hundreds of students from throughout the Northwest region received hands-on experience with many different facets of the healthcare industry as part of the ECHO Tour SM.

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Do you know an inspiring STEM Rising Star? Nominate a student today! We are looking for young thinkers, scientists, engineers, inventors, entrepreneurs, and leaders who have inspired others with their STEM experiences, in and outside the classroom. Washington STEM Rising Star Awards highlight those who will become the next generation of STEM leaders.

Washington STEM Rising Stars are high school freshmen, sophomores, or juniors from a priority population (students of color, rural, and/or low-income groups) who identify as young women or transgender/nonbinary and who explore STEM in ways that will support their education, career, personal development, and using STEM as a means of service in their community.

One awardee from the NW Washington and one awardee from Snohomish County will receive a \$250 stipend, virtual professional development opportunities focusing on building their network and telling their story, and a trip for the awardee and a parent/guardian to an in-person event at the Microsoft Bellevue campus Nov. 19. Rising Stars will be featured on the Washington STEM website and in social media campaigns.

STEM Like ME!® Helps Students in 7th & 8th Grades Explore Future Career Options at Conway Middle School

Students huddled around the Electrician Apprenticeship STEM station for a hands-on activity where magnets dropped into copper piping. They uncovered the science behind electricity at Conway Middle School on Jan. 30.

The Construction Trades employer presenters were one of six stations at STEM Like ME!® for 7th and 8th graders to learn about in-demand careers in our region. Local employer partners participated in the event from Electricians IBEW/JATC for apprenticeships/trades, PeaceHealth United General Medical Center, Didgwalic Wellness Center IT Department, Northwest Educational Service District 189 I.T. Services Silfab Solar, and Aspen Power Catamarans.

Every 12 minutes, teachers and students rotated through stations to learn about careers in NW Washington that offer a livable wage and are crucial in our communities:

- Boat building in maritime/marine trades
- Robotics/green energy in advanced modern manufacturing
- Nursing and healthcare career options
- Networking in digital technology/IT services
- Apprenticeships in construction trades

Feb. 3 and March 20: CTE Dual Credit support in the legislature

Career Connect NW's Jenny Veltri testified before the legislature on the importance of Career & Technical Education (CTE) Dual Credit and progress toward regional alignment.


With 52% of the Class of 2023 completing a CTE graduation pathway, it's critical to ensure that earned college credits are accessible, transferable, and lead to high-wage careers. Through the CTE Dual Credit Proviso, Career Connect NW has partnered with SBCTC, OSPI, high schools, and community colleges to expand opportunities and streamline processes. Proviso workgroup recommendations include dedicated administrative support, centralized technical tools, and stronger statewide credit transfer policies to ensure equitable and seamless student transitions from high school to college and beyond.

- Centering community voices remains at the forefront; we explored ways to ensure underserved communities are prioritized.














Feb. 12: Anacortes Adulting 101

Career Connect NW's Career Connected Learning Specialist Mary Powers created a Mock Interview Experience for students at the <u>Whatcom Agriculture Career Fair</u> at the Northwest Washington Fairgrounds in Lynden.

Students opted to do an 8-minute mock interview session to get feedback on what they did well and what they could improve. Students participating from schools in Skagit and Whatcom counties attended the event to help plan their futures, network with agricultural industry professionals, learn about summer job options, and explore all the diverse career options related to agriculture in the region. Students also received "7 Things to Bring to an Interview" lists in their program agenda so they could assemble their "interview kits" ahead of time.



Feb. 25: Education pathways LEADER and CSTP Regional Gathering

Facilitated by the Center for Strengthening the Teaching Profession and in partnership with the NWESD 189 and the LEADER initiative, Career Connect NW was thrilled to support this gathering at Skagit Valley College which focused on the journey of aspiring educators. By leveraging collective expertise in our community and identifying pathway options as well as gaps, this event aimed to foster a collaborative space to address regional needs and expand impact.



Feb. 26: FuturesNW's Learning with Leaders at Bellingham Technical College

Career Connect NW's Mary Powers assisted partners at Learning with Leaders/FuturesNW career exploration event series by volunteering at Bellingham Technical College (BTC).

Students from 12 high schools in the region participated in hands-on activities to learn about careers in Diesel Technology, Information Technology, Machining, Radiologic Technology, Business, Mechatronics, Surgery Technology, Process Technology, Nursing, and more. Informative sessions and tabling about Scholarships and Financial Aid, Northwest Career & Technical Academy, and BTC admissions helped students experience a well-rounded, interactive event.

March 12: Strengthening Regional Dual Credit Pathways

At this High School and Beyond Community of Practice session, college partners from Bellingham Technical College, Everett Community College, Skagit Valley College, and Whatcom Community College shared exciting progress on the CTE Dual Credit Proviso Pilot Project.

The discussion highlighted promising outcomes from the pilot and emphasized the value of strong regional collaboration between K-12 and higher education. Partners explored ways to enhance student access to dual credit opportunities by streamlining systems and removing barriers. A key highlight was the collaborative development of a regional approach to establishing CTE dual credit articulation. This includes a standardized process and shared tools designed to align procedures across institutions, making the system more efficient and transparent for educators and students. Washington STEM also provided timely legislative updates, underscoring the connection between local innovation and statelevel policy efforts.
