



ECHO Tour allows middle school students to explore healthcare careers and opportunities

In October, 125 middle school students had the chance to get an up-close look at the medical field thanks to the ECHO Tour. The students made their way through different stations, experiencing hands-on activities to learn about careers in pharmacy, nursing, dermatology, behavioral health, dementia care and more.

The Exploring Careers & Healthcare Opportunities (ECHO) Tour was presented by Career Connect NW, which is hosted at the Northwest Educational Service District 189.

This event welcomed groups from five middle schools across three districts. About 90% of the attendees reported their knowledge of the healthcare sector increased and about 85% of attendees said they have a notable likeliness of pursuing a career in the healthcare sector after participating in the ECHO Tour event.

Presentations at the event were given by Edmonds College faculty, University of Washington Bothell faculty, Northwest Ambulance, COMPASS Health, IRG Physical Therapy, Washington Poison Center, Davita, Mukilteo Memory Care, Frontier Dermatology, and a retired dental hygienist.

The ECHO Tour for middle school students was supported in part by federal money awarded to Snohomish County by the U.S. Department of Treasury. In addition, Edmonds College provided the use of their facilities at no cost, while Snohomish STEM and Economic Alliance Snohomish County provided workshop coordination assistance and volunteers for the event. 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WAVE Tour offers hands-on experience to area students

The annual WAVE (Washington Apprenticeship Vocational Education) Tour welcomed more than 330 students from 22 different high schools and the Northwest Career and Technical Academy this year. Students visited the event at a new location, the Skagit County Fairgrounds.

The WAVE Tour, presented by Career Connect NW, welcomed several trade partners. Each trade representative set up a station for students to try out skills they would use at family-wage, high-demand jobs throughout the region. This year, the group not only changed location, it also expanded the variety of trades that were represented. CCNW added several new groups and added different apprenticeship pathways, not just those in construction.

"The apprenticeship model is an incredible opportunity for students to has seen rapid growth here in Washington state over the last 10-15 years," said Donovan Tate, CCNW Career Connected Learning Specialist and event organizer. "We are so excited to provide this venue for these trade representatives to share their work with students from around our region, hopefully prompting these students to become their colleagues after graduating from high school."

The WAVE Tour, which took place over four days, welcomed students from all five counties in the NWESD's region. Roughly half of the students in attendance were seniors considering their next steps after graduating. More than 95% of students filled out a survey about the event. Of those, roughly 85% said they were likely to apply for an apprenticeship in the construction or maritime trades and 72% said their knowledge of those trades had increased.

Participating trades this year were the Southwest Mountain States Carpenters Apprenticeship, Operating Engineers Regional Training Program JATC, Brinderson, Snohomish PUD, Orcas Power and Light Cooperative (OPALCO), LiUNA! Northwest Laborers-Employers Training Trust, Northwest Maritime Apprenticeship, Matrix Service, Operative Plasterers' and Cement Masons' International Association Local 528, MacMiller and the Local 26 HVAC program, and Western Washington Sheet Metal JATC and Local 66. Students also received an Apprenticeship 101 Orientation presented by Labor and Industries.

Attendees represented key partners in developing career connected pathways; these organizations included the AGC Education Foundation, Center of Excellence for Marine Manufacturing & Technology, Economic Development Council of San Juan County, HF Sinclair, Northwest Educational Service District 189 (NWESD), Northwest Workforce Council, Port of Bellingham, Skagit Valley Herald, U.S. Department of Labor, Washington Employment Security Department, Washington State Legislature, and Western Washington University.

Dr. Ismael Vivanco, NWESD 189 Superintendent, welcomed the group and thanked both Career Connect NW for its work in facilitating the WAVE Tour as well as HF Sinclair, the primary sponsor of the event. Career Connect NW Co-Director Jenny Veltri followed, introducing Career Connect NW's goals and discussing how the WAVE Tour fits into their <u>recently published regional</u> <u>strategies</u> to increase career connected learning through 2027. Alyssa Jackson, also Co-Director for Career Connect NW, shared statistics regarding the event and explained how the WAVE Tour focuses on serving students furthest from opportunity - students of color and females are more highly represented in attendance than the industry average (<u>check out the statistics from the</u> <u>October 2024 event</u>). Sinead Fitzpatrick Plagge, Career Connected Learning Coordinator for CCNW, wrapped up the presentation explaining how these types of events fit into the bigger picture of aligning career pathways-including initiatives like CTE dual credit- for students in the region.

After learning all of this information, attendees had the opportunity to see the students in action! It was clear that the WAVE Tour is not a traditional career fair, but an experiential opportunity to get a taste of the work that these professionals engage in each day. There were great discussions regarding the WAVE Tour and also how Career Connect NW is applying the model to additional career pathways, like healthcare, through the ECHO (Exploring Careers & Healthcare Opportunities) Tour - coming to Skagit and Whatcom Counties in spring 2025.

CTE Dual Credit Proviso and Pilot Program: Building pathways to high opportunity careers

Over the past year, Career Connect NW (CCNW) at NWESD 189 has been leading the CTE Dual Credit Proviso and Pilot Program, funded by the Washington State Legislature and administered by the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges (SBCTC). Spanning the 2023-24 and 2024-25 academic years, this initiative brings together Bellingham Technical College, Everett Community College, Skagit Valley College, and Whatcom Community College along with vital input from regional high school CTE directors to increase student participation in dual credit technical programs.


This past year, CCNW and its college partners have focused on creating a shared vision for CTE Dual Credit. A significant part of this effort involved collaborating with high school partners to review and enhance dual credit procedures and articulations. Participants identified a need for a strategic approach to K-12 partnerships, recognizing gaps in knowledge and the lack of a unified framework for CTE Dual Credit across institutions.











In year two, the process group will focus on:

 Developing a Regional Shared Process: A detailed outline for establishing dual credit articulations with regional proviso colleges.

• Standardized Dual Credit Articulation Forms: A uniform form to initiate articulation requests.

• A Shared Calendar with Key Deadlines: To enhance coordination and communication across partners.

Career Connect NW secures \$80,000 Boeing grant to expand STEM pathways

With a new \$80,000 Boeing Global Engagement grant, Career Connect NW will expand educational pathways in high-demand STEM fields including data science, analytics, cybersecurity, and more. This funding supports career pathways that help set students up to earn post-secondary credentials, preparing them for family-wage careers in Washington's growing STEM workforce.

Aligned with Boeing's "Our Future" initiative, the project builds a diverse, skilled talent pipeline ready for today's dynamic labor market. With a focus on Manufacturing, Engineering, Information Technology, and Computer Science, CCNW is working to expand opportunities for all students, especially those furthest from educational equity, so they can enter promising STEM careers.

Through collaboration with Snohomish County high schools, Everett Community College, and Edmonds College, CCNW is aligning high school curricula with regional college and career pathways. This partnership expands dual credit opportunities, supports teachers, and ensures students have the tools to succeed in high-demand STEM fields. Future Ready: Demystifying minor work permits & internships event removes barriers

On Oct. 3 ,Career Connect Northwest partnered with<u>Northwest Career & Technical Academy</u> and <u>Economic Development Alliance of Skagit County</u>to bring <u>Labor & Industries (L&I)</u> Youth Employment Agent Kristen Goodge to the Future Ready: Demystifying Minor Work Permits & Internships event.

Many employers are interested in offering internships, but confusion over minor work permits, setting up a structured internship schedule, and how schools can assist in this endeavor can feel overwhelming. The event provided solutions to overcoming these barriers and made offering an internship to a minor seem a little easier in the process.

L&I shared documents needed to hire minors, hours of work limitations, break requirements, paid versus unpaid internships, and prohibited duties.













Internship 101 Trivia highlighted that it's free to apply for a minor work permit endorsement through a <u>Business License Application</u>, although there is a \$10 processing fee. Even though a Business License Application is six pages, if you are only applying for the minor work permit endorsement, only four sections on the form need to be completed. This makes the application process much shorter than many employers expect.

The event brought together employers interested in starting internship programs and work-based learning coordinators from high schools in the region. It was also noted that many students at Northwest Career & Technical Academy and <u>Sno-Isle TECH Skills Centerare</u> already 18 years old, so there are many students under 18 and over 18 eager for internship opportunities and ready to engage in the workplace.


Guiding High School Students: Register for asynchronous Resume 101 workshop

Career Connect NW created a Canvas course, "Guiding High School Students: Resume 101 Workshop," to prepare advisors, educators, counselors, and teachers to help students build a modern resume. This asynchronous Canvas course offered through pdEnroller is a resource for anyone helping students with resumes. It includes ready-to-use resume templates for students, slides to use in the classroom, and up-to-date information on how technology such as AI and Applicant Tracking Systems impact resume writing.

OSPI's High School & Beyond Plan requires students to build a resume or an activity log by the end of 12th grade. OSPI purchased SchoolLinks, Inc. for the Universal Online HSBP Platform and it will include a resume builder. The Resume 101 Workshop is an optional resource to use until the HSBP Platform is implemented, which will begin in Fall 2025. Participants enroll in the course and they can use the "grab & go" resources in the modules as often as needed! The resources are customized for schools using Microsoft platforms as well as Google platforms. Read more <u>here</u>.
